



Call for Articles

If so, we need three types of articles:

<u>Single Exposures:</u> one picture with several words to describe the picture.

Minis: three to four pictures with a paragraph or two covering the photographs. This could be a series (for example, motorcycles) or an event, such as a parade. Feature article: three or more pictures with a detailed write up of three or more paragraphs covering a subject in detail.

If you are interested in writing, but need ideas, here are some suggestions to align with the seasons: February: Valentines, end of winter, Texas highways,

early spring.

March: Spring, Texas wild flowers, weddings, gardens, fountains.

April: spring colors, in with the new, landscapes, cityscapes, outdoor music.

May: car shows, music festivals, swimming, start of summer.

The Rockwall Art League was established in 2000 in Rockwall, Texas. The purpose was to create a forum for area artists to:

- share ideas, communicate, and support each other;
- bring an awareness of fine art to the community, and
- provide scholarships to support the efforts of talented high school students.

These goals are being realized through annual exhibits, programs, studio tours and the Tom Collins Memorial Scholarship. The Rockwall Art League holds a Fine Art Show every fall, and for the last two years has also hosted a Members show at The Harbor on Lake Ray Hubbard. The Tom Collins Memorial Scholarship provides scholarships for high school students that show promise as artists. The Rockwall Art League also sponsors the ArtReach program to introduce art to people with mental, emotional, and physical challenges.

Rockwall Art League shows always have strong entries in the Photography category. This category often has more entries than any other category.

Monthly meetings are held at the community center in Harry Myers Park in Rockwall. The meetings usually include a demonstration and lecture by a well known artist. The next meeting is January 28th at 6:00 PM.

The Rockwall Art League is a member of the Rockwall Chamber of Commerce, The Old Town Shoppes of Rockwall and is supported in part by grants from the City of Rockwall Hotel Motel Tax Revenue and the Rockwall County Alliance for the Arts. 
